
The key is to make the most of the time we all have. Human interactions can be some of the most rewarding places to spend time.

## (34 House Lots and Impact on Wetlands at Issue in Planning Board pg. 1)

This neighborhood's streets (Nesbitt Drive, Smokey Road and Ogden Drive) will become collector roads for the majority of the proposed house lots and forever change the character of this quiet neighborhood, and Bow Bog Road traffic will increase as a result.

The Bow Times covered the proposed subdivision plan this past summer when it was in its conceptual stage. The formal application was filed on December 20, 2018, by G. Gardner Contracting, who does not yet own the land but has it under contract for purchase.

Since the December 20 filing date, the Planning Board has heard testimony of many abutters and other Bow residents opposing the plan. Two notable requests recommended by the Conservation Commission and raised by abutters at public hearings are the need for independent peer review confirmation of wetland boundaries and full independent study of the site's hydrology and the effects proposed construction will have on it.

The Planning Board is authorized to require these independent studies be carried out at the expense of the developer but, to date, has not done so. More details can be found in the Planning Board Minutes for January 24, 2019, and February 21, 2019.
